

COVID Task Force Weekly Update

Over the last week our four counties have averaged 405 new confirmed cases per day. The seven day rolling average Covid cases per 100,000 population for Monday, November 1 is 124.66. This is a 2.6% increase from the previous week. The chart below shows weekly covid cases per 100K population for our four counties since the first week in July.

GOVERNANCE



Policy-based Governance (PBG) Progress Report

The Board and Governance Committee continue to tackle items that will need to be in place for the June 2022 vote to formally adopt new Bylaws and Policies. As we act on new practices to clarify roles, establish accountability, and create efficiencies, you'll also notice some new terminology in our policy and communication. "Ends" and "Limitations" will help keep us on track.

Ends are a special type of goal, broader than specific annual goals. They can be established and retained for a period of time - several years, if we decide - and broadly define a shared vision that addresses a question or purpose. In this transitional period, Rev. Connie offered to get us started, using our Mission and Vision statements as a base for the question "What do we exist to do as a Church/Congregation?" The Board accepted these provisional goals:

DuPage Unitarian Universalist Church exists so that its members and friends

- *create an inclusive community.*
- *learn and grow together religiously and intellectually.*
- *experience spiritual growth.*
- *work toward fairness, love, and compassion in the larger community and the world.*

These, and future Ends, will provide a basis for reporting, assessment, and accountability against annual goals, as well as general introspection: "What progress have we made in working toward our Ends?" and "Are we living into the reason for our being?"

Limitations are guidelines set in policy that define the boundaries within which our Minister/Head of Staff can act as she or he works for the good of DuPage UU Church. Policy and procedure most often define a statement or steps that lead to a desired or expected result. An Executive Limitation policy, then, will describe the means and actions that would be unacceptable if used to achieve that desired result. In the coming months the Governance Committee will explore additions to our policies that provide this layer of balance.

Stay tuned each month for updates and opportunities. Mark on your calendar Rev. Connie's "Playshops" (3:00 – 5:00 pm on November 14, December 5, January 9, and in February/March) that not only are part of this interim year but will help set the stage for future annual conversations in our policy-based (aka: participation-based!) governance model. You are needed to help us do the work we love, better!

DuPage UU Prairie Burn

Maintenance of our restored prairie requires periodic controlled burning to suppress invasive plants and remove plant litter. This is normally done in the late fall or early spring. A professional firm has been contracted to conduct the fire safely and appropriately. Many factors determine the specific timing of the burn, including the dryness of the

plants, the moisture/snow levels, as well as weather conditions. Therefore the date of the burn is yet to be determined, but it will be held this Fall (November-December) or the Spring of 2022 (February-April). The final decision for the date to burn will be made by the contractor 24 hours before the burn. As soon as we are notified, members will be sent an announcement that the burn will occur, with encouragement to stay away for health and safety reasons. We will look forward to the healthy re-growth of the prairie!

Church opening for groups of limited size

The church is open for limited size groups. All meetings must be scheduled and confirmed through calendar@dupageuuchurch.org. If multiple meetings are taking place during the same time frame, we will stagger the start and end times so there is less cross traffic. Impromptu meetings are not allowed inside the building. **Masks will be required for entry into the building.** A supply of disposable masks will be available at the front door for those who do not bring their own.

Four meeting spaces are available, each having a different capacity. The rooms available are Founders (14 people), Learning Center (28), Kreves Hall (20) and the rear of the Sanctuary (25). We will have disinfectant supplies and hand sanitizer available in each meeting room, restrooms, and the elevators.

The following Group Expectations and Guidelines will be posted in meeting spaces and sent to group leaders:

- For the safety of your group, other groups and church staff please enforce our safety measures within your groups.
- Please ask members of your group to refrain from attending if they show signs of illness (coughing, fever, sore throat).
- Arrive no sooner than five minutes early and leave no later than five minutes after scheduled ending time.
- No community food or drinks to share.
- Wear facemask while traveling through building.
- If seated and socially distanced facemask may be removed if all parties are agreeable.
- Consider disinfecting your chair upon arrival. Use disinfectant wipe and allow a few minutes to air dry.
- If using elevator, wipe buttons with disinfect wipe after selection
- If using restroom, disinfect touched surfaces after (and before) use
- No congregating on sidewalk or public spaces after or before meeting
- Individual impromptu meetings can take place on benches in backyard.

We do encourage individuals or families to visit the church property and enjoy our prairie, gardens and labyrinth at any time (no reservation required).

Conference Announcement Fall 2021
Saturday, November 13th 9:30am-12pm

There's a strong desire among most of us to reconnect in-person with our church communities, especially if we haven't been able to thus far. Elders and families with young children, in particular, have been isolated throughout the pandemic.

We've experienced loss of family members, friends, community—and loss of whatever each of us considered our old normal. For many among us, we are filled with emotions and grieving due to the ongoing pandemic and the fleeting glimpses of what a new normal might look like.



Keynote Presenter:
Elizabeth Harding, Affiliated Community Minister at Second Unitarian Church of Chicago

Elizabeth will offer a framework for understanding the first year of grief and some reflections on collective grief during this pandemic time. The presentation will highlight coping strategies, including ritual.

The many challenges of gathering...

As a society, we've often yielded to the choices of the loudest voices. However, our UU principles compel us to also listen to and consider the quieter voices and even those without a voice.

Congregations that have resumed in-person gatherings have those among them that are concerned about serious health risks. They are more likely to be limited in their participation due to lack of options, means, or "Zoom fatigue".

Congregations that have not resumed in-person gatherings have congregants among them that are pushing to resume gathering in-person for church worship and social activities—straining some relationships and putting pressure on church leaders and staff.

Complicating plans is the very real diversity of opinion among UUs about their personal safety and the risk factors associated with: getting Covid-19 vaccinations, being around unvaccinated people or people with unknown vaccination status, and masking (and unmasking) protocols.

The pandemic, and our response to it, continues to challenge us with new problems while also providing us with opportunities to develop creative solutions and practice being in “right relationship” with each other.

Let us together explore how we can use this opportunity to strengthen our congregational communities while working through the challenges associated with gathering and building our UU communities during the ongoing pandemic.

Our panel (below) will discuss the challenges faced in gathering our UU communities, creative solutions we’ve found, and opportunities discovered along the way. Join the conference to learn and share!



Update on MidWest Leadership School



After more than 35 years of training leaders in an in-person week-long summer program, sadly it is now time to bid adieu to MidWest Leadership School.

Begun as a way to train leaders, the collaboration of then Central MidWest, Heartland (then Michigan and Ohio Valley), and Prairie Star Districts, the in-person school has produced more than 1000 graduates. Many were leaders in their congregations; some have entered professional ministry sparked in part by their experience at the school. While the curriculum was leadership, they also learned to trust themselves, work collaboratively, and connect beyond the walls of their congregation. Many "students" became "teachers" as co-creators of MWLS as lay staff. MWLS provided a deep sense of community. With the onset of the pandemic in 2020, we stopped in-person MWLS and YMWLS for safety reasons. We now realize that it would be difficult to resurrect the program as many of the necessary volunteers and co-leaders have shifted their focus, and we've also learned that we can do successful virtual leader education. While it does not create the same kind of intense and intimate learning experience as a week away at MWLS, our offerings do allow more people to attend without the barriers of being away from home for a week, and spending a sizeable amount of money to attend. Our Extended Leadership Experience in 2020-21 provided education to more than 3 times the number of a usual year, and at about 10% of the cost per person.
